

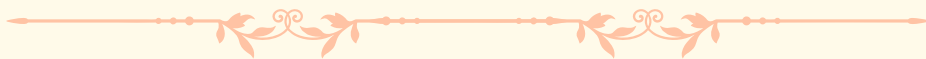

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Geographical Indications (GI)

The Geographical Indications of Goods (Registration and Protection) Act 1999 (the Act) provide for registration of Handicrafts (& Handlooms) as Geographical indications (GI). Handicraft (& Handlooms) is covered under Section 2(f) of the Act which states that “goods” means any agricultural, natural or manufactured goods or any goods of handicraft (& Handlooms) or of industry and includes food stuff. Handicraft artisans & weavers can be registered as Authorized Users for the registered Geographical Indications as provided under Section 7(3) read with Section 17 of the Act. The Act provides that any person claiming to be the producer of the goods in respect of which a geographical indication has been registered under section 6 may apply in writing to the Registrar in the prescribed manner for registering him as an authorized user of such geographical indication. As on July 31, 2016, 1152 GI Authorized user have been registered under the Act for handicraft (& Handloom) goods.

What rights does a geographical indication provide?

A geographical indication right enables those who have the right to use the indication to prevent its use by a third party whose product does not conform to the applicable standards. For example, in the jurisdictions in which the Darjeeling geographical indication is protected, producers of Darjeeling tea can exclude use of the term “Darjeeling” for tea not grown in their tea gardens or not produced according to the standards set out in the code of practice for the geographical indication.

However, a protected geographical indication does not enable the holder to prevent someone from making a product using the same techniques as those set out in the standards for that indication. Protection for a geographical indication is usually obtained by acquiring a right over the sign that constitutes the indication.

For what type of products can geographical indications be used

Geographical indications are typically used for agricultural products, foodstuffs, wine and spirit drinks, handicrafts (& Handlooms), and industrial products.

Agate bead command a good market in the countries of Middle East and African coast. Agate products are flower vases, ash trays, bangle, mortar and pestle, necklaces, paper weights, buttons, rosaries, lamp shades, earrings, rings, bracelets, chains, bowls, cufflinks, pendants etc.

Carnelian stone was supposed to contain all the five elements of nature earth, wind, water, fire and space inside. It is acclaimed to be the most pious stone on earth.

Blood is most extensively used variety of agates, used to make jewelry as well as products.

The other common agates include White king, Khyaldar Grey, Yellow, Navrang, Moss, Red Jasper – Red colored stone, Fancy, Black agate, Sfatik (Crystal), Rose Quartz etc.

Agra Durrie is a traditional hand woven textile product. It is a flat woven pileless rug having a rich variety of designs and colours. It is essentially a thick cotton woven fabric meant for spreading on the floor. It is a weft-faced fabric on both its sides as warp is completely covered by the weft. In its simplest form, it is made in plain weave and in geometrical patterns using tapestry technique (cut shuttle as locally called) in different colours running from side to side or broken into rectilinear sections or with simple patterns in single colour or multi colours.



Alleppey Coir

The coir yarn have been produced from time immemorial throughout the coastal belt of Kerala. It is reported that ancient travelers like Megasthenes have taken many valuable gifts including coir rope produced in Malabar coast.

Coconut fibre is extracted from the husk of coconut by dehusking, retting and beating. The husks separated from the nuts are retted in lagoons up to ten months. The retted husks are then beaten with wooden mallets manually to produce the golden fibre.

The fibre is later spun into yarn on traditional spinning wheels called "Ratts". The yarns then dyed in the required colours and woven to make different products. The product made are coir mats, rugs, tiles, baskets etc. The coir is also used in many applications such as making fish nets, plant climbers and also used for industrial, agricultural and domestic applications.

Arani is a town in Thiruvannamalai District, 142 kms from Chennai in Tamil Nadu. These sarees were woven by using dobby/jacquard with two-fold mulberry silk threads in warp and weft. The border has thin line of Zari or small designs. These saree weights about 300-400 grams which are lesser than that of Kancheepuram saree. Sarees are woven either with one side border or double side border, but without interlocking (Korvai) the body and border as done in Kancheepuram Saree.

Aranmula metal mirror is a rare piece of craft that had existed even during the Vedic period of Indian history. The myth about the origin and secret of its composition makes it a truly fascinating craft. As traditional as the mirror-making technology is, it is believed that the composition of the metal mirror is divine and some undisclosed metals alloyed with silver, bronze, copper and tin are responsible for the distortion-free images.

The crown made out of the combination of copper and tin turned out to be a marvel of art and craft. It was silver like colour, brittle like glass, shine with rare brilliance, and when cleaned it acquires the quality of reflection. Although brittle, high – tin bronzes also known as speculum metal, yielded a highly polished surface & a clear reflected image.

These mirrors are very popular for their clarity, indeed, the ancient art of making metal mirrors is still practiced without modification.



Bagh Prints of Madhya Pradesh

The hand block printed fabrics from Bagh are popularly known as Bagh prints. The designs are very typical with geometrical patterns inter-laced such that the total effect of the repeating patterns give a very harmonious appearance and appeal to the fabric. It's done totally in black and red on white surface using natural colors (Vegetable colors).

Bagh prints of Dhar (MP) are approximately one thousand years old, a traditional craft, carried on from one generation to the next, within the family.

The block designs that have managed to survive with time are nearly 200 years old and are still being used, some of them are 100 to 50 years old and on printing still find a market for themselves.

Some old blocks and their names that are being still used are Nandana, Laheriya, Attha, Nandana ki mirache, Nandana ka butta, Aabotcha butta etc.

Different types of products are cushion covers mainly in cotton, table covers etc.

The block printing craft of Bagru is unique and has its own distinct character. Bagru was historically recognized as producing more upscale products for royal clientele and for use in temples. The Print designs and colour are such that these are ideal for rural folk. The design and colours of Bagru prints have been greatly improved and diversified to meet the requirement of the designers and export market.



The Production requires high degree of coordination of eyes, hands and allied pressure on the blocks.

The main tools of the printer are wooden blocks in different shapes - square, rectangle, oval, round and semi-circular or crescent - and sizes called bunta. Blocks are hand-carved of seasoned teak wood and on the bottom face the motifs are engraved with steel chisels of different widths and cutting surface by the carver. Each block has a wooden handle and two to three cylindrical holes drilled into the block for free air passage and also to allow release of excess printing paste. The new blocks are soaked in oil for 10-15 days to soften the grains in the timber. These blocks sometimes have metal over the wood.

Balaramapuram is a small town 15 km away from Thiruvanthapuram in Kerala. These traditional products are woven with kora white cotton yarn (grey or unbleached or non-dyed yarn) of finer counts like 80's, 100's etc.

Specialty of the saree lies in preparation of the warp thread which is sized (starched) with the help of brush. The threads become almost round in shape after sizing so the saree has very clear surface without any superfluous or extra fibres protruding on it.

Baluchari Saree is an extra-ordinary silk saree of West Bengal. This saree is known for depictions of mythological scenes and figurative patterns on the pallu. It was mainly produced in Murshidabad but presently in Bishnupur and its surroundings. Degummed mulberry silk yarn with low twist is used both in warp and weft. The design is woven in extra weft. The intricate pallu design developed in different layers in rectangular fashion in boxes makes the saree unique. No zari or metallic yarn is used for designing.

The Banaras Brocade sarees are made of finely woven silk and decorated with intricate design using zari and because of these ornamentations it is relatively heavy. Their special characteristics are Mughal inspired designs/elements such as intricate floral and foliate motifs kalga and bel. Other features are gold work, compact weaving, figures with small details, metallic visual effects, jal (a net like pattern) and meena work. These are woven on conventional Banaras handloom jacquard and sometimes with jala, pagia & naka attachment for creation of motif.

Meenakari, also called enameling, is the art of decorating a metal surface by fusing mineral substances on it. Meenakari was introduced in India by the Mughals. The process is often applied to kundan- articles of jewelry studded with gem stones set with a layer of gold foil between the stone and the mount on one side while the reverse is lavishly enameled using the meena technique. The lustre of the meena the enameled reverse side, increase over time due to contact with the wearer's body and clothes. The brilliance of the diamonds and other stones is effectively complemented by the multihued enamel of the meena. Varanasi, Uttar Pradesh, is one of the oldest cities in India. It has a very rich culture and history and was the capital of ancient Kashi region.



The present meenakar at Varanasi comment that the state of art of meenakari was prosperous till about hundred years ago.

Repousee is done on all typr of articles, which are first moulded into the required shape and burnished; the engraver traces the design with a chisel, filling up the open ground with dots and spots produced by punching. The work is very light, and often little more outlines drawing. It is certain that formerly much more skill was exhibited by the Benares engravers, and the decay of their art may be attributed partly to the influence of western ideas.

The process of metal repousee craft is completely handmade using the traditional tool. It is a complete home based work where the artisans are working since generation.

Dhokra crafts are made by casting bell metal (brass and bronze) manually through the vanishing wax technique. These handicrafts include items like ornamented animals, tribal figures of varying sizes. The process of making the moulds is as old as the craft. All the decoration is done with wax strings. Wax is the appropriate medium for this craft because of its unique softness and malleability. It can be drawn out in wires of required diameters and can be moulded into desired shapes. These people worship sun, moon, fields, mountain, jungle, etc. which forms a major part of their designs and motifs. The Dhokra art is a major attraction of Bastar.

Lohshilp or wrought iron craft is one of the most unique and the oldest craft form in Bastar region. It has an aesthetic appeal inspite of its simplistic form. The art originated from the ironsmith community that used to make farming and hunting implements for tribes. Over the years, the craft has beautifully evolved into an artistic form and so has its worldwide demand. Wrought iron work is mainly concentrated in Bastar district of Chattisgarh with Kondagaon, Umargaon and Gunagaon being the main centers.

The raw material used for the craft is predominantly recycled iron scrap, taken from household or market. The main tools used are Dhukna Sar (furnace), Muthli (hammer), Chimtas (forceps), Sandasis (tongs) and Chennai (chisels). These tools are made locally by the lohars themselves. The process starts with scrap iron being beaten repeatedly when hot. It requires no casting and moulding. Desired shape is given carefully by beating it at necessary spots. Then unnecessary portions are cut away and filed to remove sharp edges. On completion, varnish coat is applied to enhance the luster.

Both hollow and solid figures are made. For making a hollow figure, iron sheets are folded, cut and filed as per the need of the form.

The wooden crafts are most famous, beautiful and unique art of wooden carving of Bastar tribal. The products are idols, wall panels, furniture items etc. among the furniture items Deewan (Cot with box) is very famous and attractive since it involves the art of carving with different pictures of Bastar culture and other design of interest.

Theses wooden crafts are made out of the finest teak wood, sheshum, sagon, and shivna wood. These handicrafts are generally exported to different places of the country, and it has demand even from foreign countries also.

The product made by the artisans of Bastar, basically tribal people were for their own use but nowadays they are making it for commercial use. These products may also have some cultural importance to these people.

The main product of Datia casting was anklets worn by women over years. This was later reduced in number, as they were heavy. This was then converted into utility item by adding a plate underneath and converting them into ashtrays and later into boxes to keep nick-knacks.

The main feature of Datia is the jali work done on the walls of the product.

Tikamgarh : Bell Metal products of Tikamgarh are plain and solid in appearance with decorations of fine work at certain places. The products have a rustic appeal. These products do not have any resemblance to Jaliwork of Datia.

Berhampur resham pata saree is a traditional product of Odisha. The "saree" is meant for women and the "joda" is meant for men. For this famous silk work, Berhampur is also known as silk city of India. The Berhampuri silk saree is unique due to its typical Odissi style of weaving and kumbha, particularly phoda, temple type design. "The zari work border design is different from others. The sarees also adorn the deities of Jagannath, Balabhadra and Subhadra at the Jagannath temple in Puri.

The Bhagalpur silk is developed from wild tussar silk. The texture of yarn is rough as a result the saree also has rough texture. The design patterning is done by contrast extra weft yarn on 4 shaft frame loom. The design pattern mainly consists of stripes, checks, solid colour or surface ornamentation is done once the base fabric is developed. The product range developed out of tussar silk includes saree, dress material, stole, dupatta and home furnishings.

Bhavani Jamakkalam refers to plain thick durries manufactured in Bhavani in Erode district in Tamil Nadu. It is woven with coarser cotton yarn threads enabling weavers to weave different kinds of designs which are mostly limited to stripes in horizontal direction developed with the use of different coloured weft yarns. Now-a-days, Jamakkalams are also used to make fashion products and accessories such as backpacks, carry bags etc.



Bidriware

The term 'Bidriware' originates from the township of Bidar, which is still the only town that manufactures the unique metalware. Due to its striking inlay artwork, Bidriware is an important export handicraft of India and is prized as a symbol of wealth. The metal used is a blackened alloy of zinc and copper inlaid with thin sheets of pure silver.

The origin of Bidriware is usually attributed to the Bahamani sultans who ruled Bidar in the 13th –15th centuries. Abdullah bin Kaiser, a craftsman from Iran was invited by the Sultan to work on decorating the royal palaces and courts. According to some accounts, Kaiser joined hands with local craftsmen and gave birth to Bidriware. Since then, the craft has been handed down succeeding generations mostly among the local Muslim and Lingayat sects.

Bidriware is manufactured from an alloy of copper and zinc (in the ratio 1:16) by casting. The zinc content gives the alloy a deep black color. First, a mould is formed from soil made malleable by the addition of castor oil and resin. The molten metal is then poured into it to obtain a cast piece which is later smoothened by filing. The casting is now coated with a strong solution of copper sulphate to obtain a temporary black coating over which designs are etched freehand with the help of a metal stylus.

Blue Pottery of Jaipur

Blue pottery of Jaipur can be easily recognized predominance of blue color on them. The brilliance of blue created from cobalt oxide is striking and is the key shade to create the visual appeal of these items. The use of yellow, green and other colors enhance the traditional color palette of white and blue. The blue pottery products are quite light weight. The surface shines but the shine is less glossy. The entire item / product is covered with decorative motifs and filled entirely with colors. The traditional motifs like tessellating type of jaali, all over motifs and the stylized floral designs reflect their Persian origins. The adherence to hand painting has lent a high level of delicacy to this art and has contributed to the designs looking fresh and full of life.



Bobbili Veena

Bobbili Veena is a traditional musical instrument which is also known as Saraswathi Veena. It has great importance and significance in the evolution of music and in particular carnatic music in our country. The Bobbili Veenas are made up of seasoned jackfruit woods and is an integral part of carnatic music. Vibrant designs and colors are used in order to

give the veenas a designer look. Designs of flowers and leaves are inlaid on the main plastic sheet. The Veena is mostly made up of a single piece of jackfruit wood called as Ekandi Veena. In some cases, one joint near the dandi and alley is used.

There are 4-5 varieties of Bobbili Veenas. They are :

1) Ekandi- made out of single log wood, 2) Kamalam – Lotus, 3) Nemali – Peacock, 4) Swarna Mandal – peacock shaped only for showcase purpose

The Veenas weight around 18-20 kilos. The gift veenas, which are used as show piece or decorative items, measure 9-23 inch in total length and the base measurement is 3-4 inch in diameter. These veenas weigh around 250-300 gms.

Bomkai Saree & Fabrics

The Bomkai saree has been originated from a small village called Bomkai in Ganjam district, 156 Km from Bhubaneswar in Odisha. Fine cotton yarns of count (2/80, 2/100, 2/120s), mulberry silk, tasar silk and zari etc are being used extensively. It is woven on fly shuttle pit looms as well as frame looms. Three shuttle technique is used to get solid border effect. Extra warp design in border and extra weft design in body and pallu are woven with the help of dobby/jacquard/jala.



Brass Broidered Coconut Shell Craft of Kerala

Coconut shell brass broidered craft is popular craft in Kerala. A high degree of skill is required for carving brass broidered items out of coconut shells, especially hookahs. The brass broiderd decoration work is made through lost wax process which requires high degree of skill and perfection.

The raw material needed is just fine quality of coconut shell which is obtained from coconut trees abundantly cultivated in Kerala. Colour combination of

coconut shell with brass gives an excellent appeal.

The coconut shell is the most versatile part of the coconut – the shell which is organic in nature. Since it has good durability characteristics, high toughness and abrasion resistant properties, it is suitable for long standing use. The shell is similar to hard woods chemical composition though lignin content is higher and cellulose content is lower.

Specification of bindelu: Bindelu is made from brass metal, which is an alloy of copper and zinc.

Descreption:

This brass vessel is made particularly only in Budithi. It is a two piece vessel which is made by beating two different sheets of brass till the required shape is achieved. The two pieces are welded and then finished from the inside. The mouth of the vessel is made by welding a casted ring to the finished sphere. It is then finished by scraping out the outer surface of the vessel and polishing it, which imparts luster.

Bell cast from bell metal is used in temples. It is one of the oldest and famous craft of Budithi. This product is normally in high demand through out the year. It is highly resonant which provides a longer lasting sound than general.

The embroidery work done on a hand spun khaddar or a fine muslin cloth which is in square format, The size of Chamba Rumal vary from as small as handkerchief to Towels to as big as Bed Sheets (Spread Sheets).

The colour of thread used in the Chamba Rumal varies and no Rumal is ever embroidered in a single colour, In the folk style, the colours tend to be bright and bold and include pink, lemon yellow, purple and green. The more sophisticated colour palette includes ochre, dark green, blue and paler shades.

The Chamba Rumal weaving was effected by a double satin stitch carried forward and backwards alternately, done simultaneously on the two sides of the cloth, so that the space on both sides is filled up making the embroidered field on both faces appear equally effective and similar in content. This technique is known as Do-Rukha. The satin stitch is resorted to for covering large and continuous patterns spread over a wide surface without pressurizing the cloth.

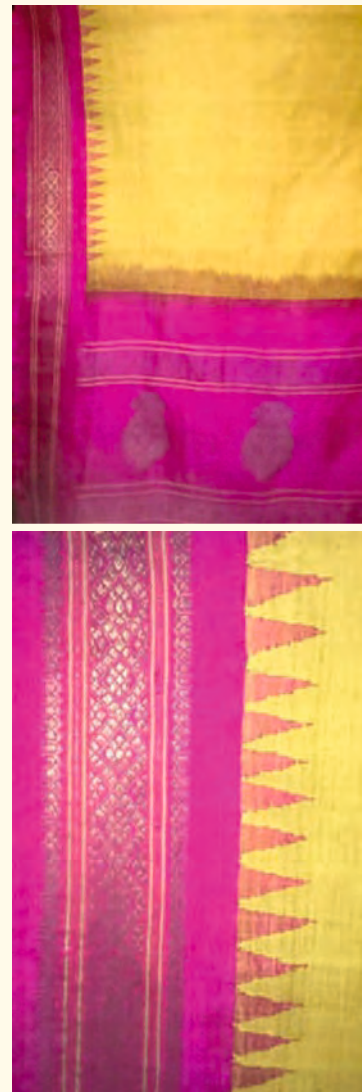

Ganjifa is the card game, which is believed to have come to India from Persia, and became popular in India during the Mughal emperors period in 16th century. Playing cards was a part of Indian culture especially during the festivals or functions (occasions) where all the community members sit together and spend their time in playing these cards. Sawantwadi is a place located in the Sindhudurg district of Maharashtra, which was earlier capital of a territory, ruled by the Bhonsle king of the Marathas where the Ganjifa cards are made till date.

Classic Mughal Ganjifa cards were long with Arabic/urdu language writing on it with 96 cards and 8 suits. Senior King Khem Sawant Bhonsle III heard about the cards from the Telengana region scholars. Based on the administration of the state, 9 department depending on the state i.e. one king was looking after each department of which 1 to 10 are there, 96 cards of colors black, chocolate, red, green etc were there. Earlier cards were made of ivory, tortoise shell, mother of pearl for royal society and for commoners from papier-mache, palm leaf or cloth.

The origin of hand knotted carpets locally known as "Kal baffi" dates back to 15th century after which it progressively attained the high degree of perfection. It is said that Sultan Zain-ul-Abidin brought carpet weavers from Persia and central Asia in to Kashmir to train the local inhabitants.

Carpets from 200 knots to 900 knots/sq. inch both in wool & silk yarn have attained such excellence that they rank amongst the finest in the world. The loom used in Kashmir carpet weaving is composed of two horizontal wooden beams between which the wrap threads are stretched, one beam in front of the weaver and the second behind the first. The difference between a carpet and other hand woven rugs lies in the fact that short lengths of the thread or yarn are tied to wrap chains to form the pile of the carpet. These are commonly called knots though it is a loop rather than an actual knot.

There are different types of knots and in Kashmir the Farsi baff and the Persian system known as Sehna, or Sinneh, knot is originally used. Very simple tools are used to thread these knots, a wood or Metal comb to push knots and weft tightly together and pair of short scissors to cut the pile of the carpet to an even form once it is finished.

Paper mache is one of the most beautiful handicrafts of Kashmir. The construction of paper mache products has two essential processes which involves making of the object and cleaning of forest pine Kaylier (one of the pine variety). It is believed that the craft has traveled from Iran to Kashsmir and was introduced by King Zainul Abidin. Iranian name of the craft is Kari Qalamdane which means a pen stand.



There are a variety of items prepared by the craftsmen of Kashmir which have beautiful designs and colours and include pen stands, coasters, jewellery boxes, flower vases, lamp shades, trays, photo frames and decorative bowls;" all of which have demand out side the country too. Some of the items have pure silver or gold dust sprinkled onto them to increase their beauty. This technique is similar to that of tapestry weaving in which different colored 'Tillis' are used to make colourful pattern. The design pattern is mainly inspired by Mughals.

Sozni (or suzani) embroidery is a style of embroidery from Jammu and Kashmir region in the northwest of the Indian subcontinent. The motifs are created in satin stitch and are worked identically on both sides of the cloth, but sometimes in different colours (for example, the dominant colour may be red on one side and blue on the other). This type of work/stitch is sometimes called Dorukha.

The most popular motifs consists of abstract geometric designs, stylised flowers, as well as paisley patterns. They are normally worked in one or two colours, or very occasionally three colours. Sometimes the ground cloth is woven in such a manner (such as with a compound weave) that it has different, dominant colours on either side of the material, to complement the different colours of the embroidery threads.

Sozni embroidery is, among others, used especially to decorate shawls, and for the panels along the side of the cloth.

Walnut Wood Carving is generally identified as products made of walnut wood from Kashmir and further embellished with hand carving of traditional designs and motifs by traditional carvers (naqash) from Kashmir.

Traditional Walnut Wood Carving in Kashmir is a highly specialized craft industry with

streamlined stages of production, each performed by specialized artisans. The main and unique part is considered to be the carving process which essentially increases the value to the product and is unique to the region. The Walnut trees are available at an altitude of 5500 to 7500 feet above sea level in semi hilly areas. The best quality walnut wood is obtained from Shupiyan and Anantnag.

Kasuti, believed to be derived from the word kashidakari, the generic name for embroidery, merely refers to embroidery by hand. It is a skill requiring prolonged and rigorous training. Kasuti embroidery is believed to have originated from north Karnataka which spread all over the region.

Embroidery is seen as an essential part of the sari, not as mere embellishment. Kasuti embroidery consists of four prominent stitches: gavanti, double running stitch, muragi, zigzag running stitch neygi, daring stitch and menthe, cross stitch.



Traditionally, this embroidery technique was used on fabrics related to the rituals of marriage, childbirth and festivities as well as daily wear for women and children and on household accessories.

Marionettes or string puppets in Rajasthan is known as: Kathputli (Kath- wood, putli – doll, figure). The kathputli tradition of Rajasthan is an ancient art and its practitioners have entertained, made social commentary, and passed down important information for countless generations.

The male and female puppets bear a strong resemblance to the Rajput miniature paintings of Rajasthan. The style of head dress, the shape of the eye, the beard and moustache style are used to depict the character of the puppet. The male figures are generally divided into 2 categories: Hindu Rajas and Mughal Nawabs. The traditional set of puppets for the Amar Singh Rathore play used to be of 52 characters.

Nowadays, the puppeteers make small cheap non-functional puppets, varying from 2" to 2 ft. length, and sell them to domestic and foreign tourists, and earn their major part of income from this.

Historically the Nuapatna owes its origin and importance to Lord Jagannath Temple. A section of artisans in village called bunkar (weaving community in Odisha) were allotted the work of temple as Sevakas (servants of the God) for weaving decorative cloths for Lord Jagannath (Lord of Universe), Devi Subhadra and Lord Balabhadra (Brother & Sister of Lord). Subsequently the decorative clothes were known all over as Khandua saree (Khandua Pata in Odisha).

Khatamband is one of the oldest known forms of woodcraft in Kashmir, a result of the unique combination of the geo-climatic conditions and the socio-cultural history of the region. The treatment of the wood and related practices including craftsmanship is indigenous and unique to the Kashmir region.

The basic technique consists of small pieces of wood inserted into grooved battens. Each piece of wood is intricately carved and then fitted together to form intricate geometrical designs with a definite mathematical foundation. The battens and the pieces are alternatively fitted to each other without using nails or glue in such a manner that they can be dismantled again down to the last component. The pieces are held together with the help of three different types of joints which forms the basic technique of Khatamband. The intricate designs originate from the geometrical tessellating patterns of Islamic tradition.

Although there are more than 120 design with variations, some of the well known designs are Mouje, Panch Muraba, Murba Badam, Shesh Gul, Char Gul, Hasht Kan Chot, Chengis Kheini, Pohl Girdan and Darwaza Girdh. One of the most intricate and time consuming design is the Barah Murabba Which has around 3750 pieces in a ceiling of 10 ft x 10 ft size. The smallest piece can be less than 40mm or 1.5 inches.

A unique form of applique work is practiced in Sitamarhi and Madhubani Districts of Bihar. Begun as a revived craft practice, applique work have transcended their forms through the imaginations of women to become a new and at times uncompromising art.



An outline was first drawn and colours filled in subsequently; the whole tradition of painting in Mathila may therefore be described as “coloured drawings”

Applique is a craft which has waste pieces of cloth as its raw material. Articles produced by this craft were used by kings and emperors and the nobles in the past as shamiana and chandowa.

Origin of Khurja's pottery work has been said with at least two different stories. In one legend, Afghan King Taimur Lung accompanied Egyptian and Syrian potters during his campaign in the Khurja region over 500 years ago. In another legend, potters had been moved to the region during Mughal Empire while another version

says there were no long historical events in accordance with pottery tradition in Khurja.

However, the author of "Pottery-making Cultures and Indian Civilization" mentioned that "Khurja in Bulandshahr is one of the oldest centers for glazed pottery in India". Further mentioned, "These potters often call themselves as Multani Kumhars suggesting that their origin was Multan".

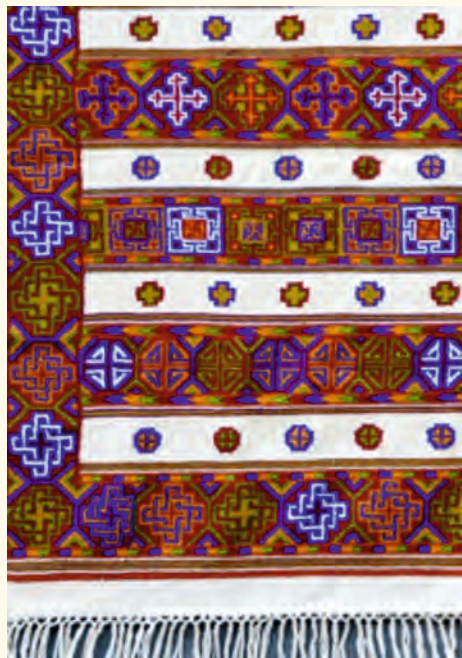
The artisans of Kinhal make idols for the temples, vahanas and palanquins for ceremonial processions to carry the deities.

They also make idols for homes and shops for Dasara festivals and other occasions.



Historically, the art of Kinhal forms an integral part of the Vijayanagar painting and sculpture style. The craftsman of Kinhal have drawn inspiration from the murals of Lepakshi temple in AP and from Pampatheswara temple at Hampi, in Karnataka.

The craft flourished under the royal patronage of the Vijayanagar Empire. It is claimed that the village of Kinhal was awarded an 'Inam' to artisans community by the Kings of Vijayanagar Empire in appreciation of the work rendered by the artisans for the palaces, temples, chariots etc.

Konark is an important centre for stone-carving. Soft stone, red sand stone and granite are used for carving. Konark specializes in icons and figures carved in different dance poses.

The art dates back to the late 6th century or early 7th century AD.

The process of doing is that the basic design is traced on the stone and it is given a crude shape. The final carving is then carried out and the items are polished.

The process is carried by the reduction of a block of stone to a finished state using a variety of tools. Procedures of carving processes can be used to create masonry for construction or for decorative purposes or both combined.

The cotton yarn provides strength and suppleness whereas fine raw silk makes the fabric transparent and delicate.

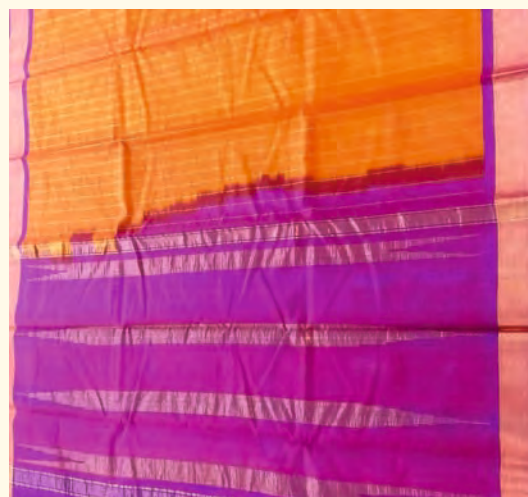

Kutch Embroidery is an evolving expression of the craft and textile traditions of the Rabaris, a nomadic tribe in Gujarat. This folk embroidery is done using cotton or silk thread on cotton cloth. Certain styles use silk and a satin-like material too. Square chain, double buttonhole, pattern darning, running stitch, satin and straight stitches are used to create intricate patterns. With liberal use of multi-shaped glass pieces, the garments literally glitter, and, every bold stitch and glass piece used is reflective of the rituals and folklore of the Rabaris.



Kutch embroidery is unique in the sense that a net is woven on a cloth using thread. The net is then filled in using the same thread by intricate interlocking stitches. The patterns are usually built around geometric shapes.

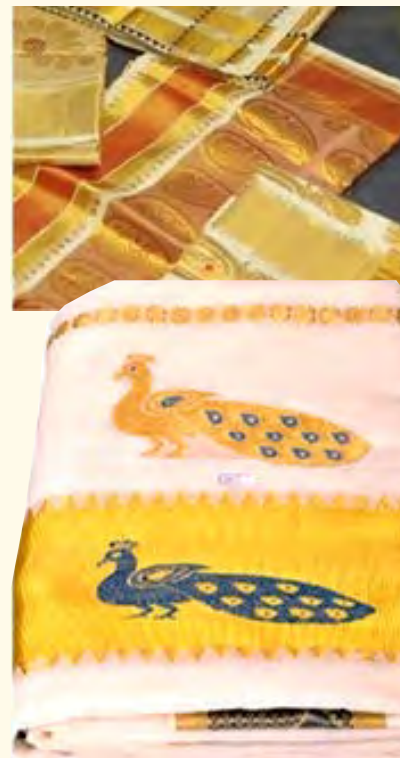

Buti designs are also woven on the body of the saree with zari. The pallu of the saree is woven with zari by using jacquard. Specialty of the saree lies in preparation of warp thread in "street sizing" technique. The warp threads become almost round and uniform in shape after sizing so that the saree has very clear surface without any protruding fibres on it.

The city of Indore is 188km. from Bhopal , the capital of Madhya Pradesh and is situated in the southwest direction of the state. Indore is a progressive city and is also termed as mini Mumbai due to its adoption of advanced technology, life style and a large number of textile mills. The leather toys appear realistic and most of them in animated sequence, in that each toy represent a different motion e.g. there are different types of horses in different motions like a running horse, a jumping horse, a grazing horse, a neighing horse, a galloping horse, a standing horse. So there is a range to pick from. Similarly there is a sitting elephant, elephant blowing his trumpet, etc. The texture of the skin of the animal is given using pointed tools on the paper pulp when it is still wet and applied on the hay mould by hand keeping in

mind the texture of the animal skin in question. Working like an artist this gives it a very realistic look. Later when it is dyed and given deeper shades by hand painting the texture is further enhanced.

Traditional chikankari was embroidered on Muslin cloth with a white thread. Gradually the work was started on other fabrics like organdie, Mulmul, Tanzeeb, Cotton and Silk. Presently all types of fabrics, namely Voil, Chiffon, Linen, Rubia, Khadi handloom Cloth, Terry Cotton, Polyester, Georgette. Terry voil etc. are used in Chikan Embroidery.

Chikan is a type of white work, that is to say white embroidery on white fabric, with predominantly floral designs executed on fine cotton with untwisted threads of white cotton, rayon or silk. It is an embroidery that has evolved over centuries, reaching its peak in the late nineteenth century in Lucknow. True chikan has the unique property of being limited to a fixed repertoire of stitches, each of which is only ever used in a certain way. This repertoire consists of thirty-two stitches (five of which are common to other forms of embroidery), five derivatives and seven stitches that form an embossed shape, usually a leaf or petal. These small individual petals help identify chikan.



The process of Chikankari undergoes five different stages namely cutting, stitching, printing, embroidery, washing and finishing.

The Lucknow Zardozi is mainly produced in the Lucknow district of Uttar Pradesh. First of all the designs is traced on paper by a pencil and small holes are punched on it at close intervals. The pin pricked design on the paper is placed on the piece of fabric to be embroidered and smeared with zinc solution which passes through the holes making the impression on the cloth. The other powders used for tracing of designs are khadiya, neel (indigo), gum depending on the colour of the cloth to be embroidered. When the tracing is worn out after prolonged use, the copies are made by repunching the tracing on two or three papers for reuse. Traditionally during the Mughal period, nakkash, the professional artists, used to draw the designs in the court karkhana where several crafts were carried on simultaneously. Now a days Zardozi artisans draw their drawing themselves, which are called

Khakha, generally drawn by good artists among zardozi, who provide the copies to their fellowmen.

Next process involves laying of different varieties and shapes of metallic wire and other materials like glass, beads, etc.

A distinction of technique exists in the ari work, where instead of small pieces of pure metallic wire only kalabattu is used.

Maddalam is considered to be a divine instrument or “Deva Vadys” on account of its inclusion as a major accompaniment in the dance of Shiva and dates back to 13th Century.

It is basically a percussion instrument used in Kerala as an accompaniment to temple art forms like kathakali, panchavadyam, keli etc.

Cylindrical in shape maddalam is till today chiseled out of a single piece of jackfruit wood. The hollow ends of this elongated chiseled out drum are tightly strapped with a combination of cow and buffalo leather to create the required percussion impact. There are two varieties of maddalam – Suddha maddalam and Toppi maddalam. The former is tied around the waist of the drummer with a cloth while other version is suspended from the neck.

It is very common to find small workshops running in the houses of artisans. The colouring on the goods is done for many purposes and with different techniques. First and the foremost, there are goods on which some kind of carving (especially hand carving) has been done. It may be the carving on a metal sheet and then the metal sheet is given a shape or a cast good on the surface of which carving is done. After the carving , the carved portion of good is coloured. For colouring, it is dipped into a container filled with hot colour for some time. This process provides colours on the surface of the dipped goods.

Sand based metal casting process is used in making metal handicraft items. The sand mould casted goods are produced by forming a cavity from a sand mixture and pouring molten liquid metal into the cavity in the mould. The mould is then cooled until the metal has solidified and then separated from the mould.

- These four parts are joined together with the help of screw threads.
- Lamps also in the form of a branching tree each branch ending in a small tray or bowl for the oil and the wick.
- Kuthuvilakkus are manufactured in various sizes and also in the form of a standing woman holding in her hands a shallow bowl to contain the oil and the wick.
- They are used on religious and ceremonial occasions and are fashioned out of brass.
- The manufacture of bell-metal wares has always been the traditional occupation of the Pather community. However, in recent years, it has not been possible to obtain raw materials for the manufacture of bell-metal ware. Tin has become costly and scarce and so many of the members of the Pather community bade goodbye to their Craft.

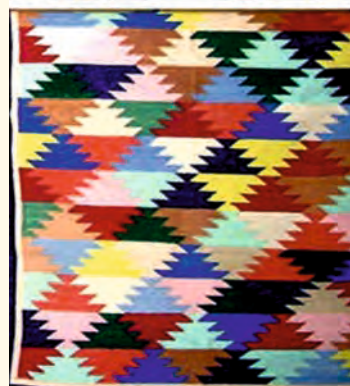

2. Now on the smooth surface of the Board primer is coated and allowed to dry. After drying a coat of Ducor lapam is applied to the board. The primer applied before helps in better grip to the board. Now after drying of the lapam water paper is rubbed on the surface to get a very smooth finish.
3. On this the desired background color is applied on the board like black, brown, yellow, etc. based on the theme. The colors are synthetic (Nitrocellulose colors).

The paintings of patachitra is a living art which has its roots since ancient times. The word Pattachitra is derived from the Sanksrit word "patta", which means a painted piece of cloth or a plate; chitra means paintings or picture. The brilliantly colored patachitra were produced at Puri as souvenirs for the pilgrims of the Jaganath temple. Themes for these paintings range from incidents in Krishna life and the avatars of Vishnu to the epic tales of Ramayana and Mahabharata.

The method of production for Pattachitra is very long and entire process is completed in many steps. The artists and his family together perform these steps which are preparation of patta, preparation of pigments, motif selection and layout, and finally painting. Each and every step is very crucial for the proper end product any mistake in any of these steps can lead to faulty painting. This being the tradition of these craftsmen they follow it very religiously.

Pattamadai, a small village in Tirunelveli district, is the traditional home to a unique tradition of mat weaving by Labbai Muslims from 'korai' grass grown on the banks of river Tamiraparani. A hand-woven superfine silk mat was even sent to Queen Elizabeth-II on the occasion of her coronation in June, 1953. The traditional brass lamps are made in Nachiarkoil, a town in Kumabakonam taluk.

The mat is woven using cotton or silk in the weft. Use of silk thread gives a royal sheen and definite appeal to the mat. This comes from Pattamaadai, a small village in Thirunelveli district of Tamil Nadu, and hence its name. The majority of mats made in here have cotton warps and Korai (Marsh reed) wefts. Korai belongs to the sedge family of plants, Cyperaceae. Korai grass is found in abundance along the banks of the rivers and in marshy areas in Tamil Nadu and Kerala. The most unique aspect of a Pattamadai mat is how soft and flexible it is. The mats, depending on the weaving range from soft to super fine. The finest and most closely woven mats are called "pattu pai" or silk mats because they feel like a bolt of silk and fall like cloth. It takes nearly 45 days of soaking and processing and then about 2 - 3 weeks to make a single mat. The processing and weaving time can extend to nearly 4 months for a super fine "pattu" pai.

Payyannur Pavithra Mothiram is a kind of gold ring worn by Indians for its ritualistic value. This holy ring is worn during the rituals of pithru bali, or the prayer for the dead ancestors of the person. This ring was traditionally made of Dharba grass. However, the modern Pavithra Mothiram is made of gold. The shape of the ring is unique and it looks like a knot. Silver is also used for making the ring. It is worn on the right ring finger while performing poojas for the dead ancestors.



The origin of the holy ring is associated with the history of the Payyannur Subramanya Temple. The temple used to insist on wearing grass rings while performing holy rites. Later on, the priests switched to gold rings for the purpose of durability. A traditional craftsman takes a whole day to make one ring. They cannot eat meat or drink alcohol during their lifetime to become a holy artisan.

The word 'pavithram' means 'purity' and 'Mothiram' means 'ring'. Both these words are from the Malayalam language which is the local language of the Kerala state in India.

The method of production of Pembarthi Metal Craft involves the following six steps:

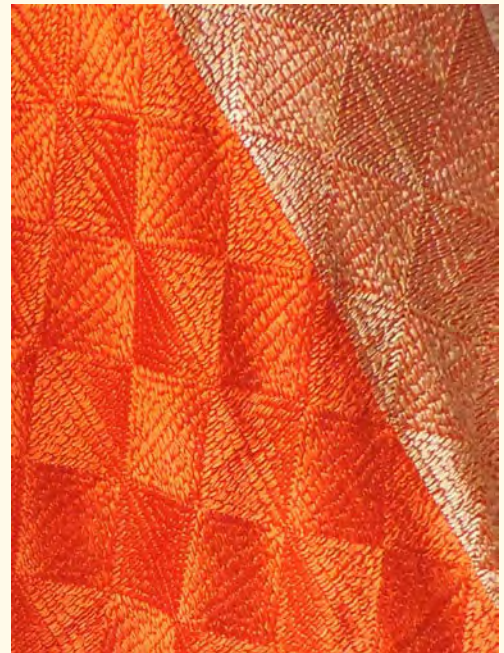

Punjab is known for its Phulkaris. The embroidery is done with floss silk thread on coarse hand woven cotton fabric. Geometrical patterns are usually embroidered on the Phulkaris.

Phulkari embroidery technique from the Punjab region (divided between India and Pakistan) literally means flower work, which was at one time used as the word for embroidery, but in time the word "Phulkari" became restricted to embroidered shawls and head scarfs. Simple and sparsely embroidered odini (head scarfs), dupatta and shawls, made for everyday use, are called Phulkaris, whereas garments that cover the entire body, made for special and ceremonial occasions like weddings and birth of a son, fully covered fabric is called Baghs ("garden") and scattered work on the fabric is called "adha bagh" (half garden). This whole work is done with white or yellow silk floss on cotton khaddarh and starts from the center on the fabric called "chashm-e-bulbul" and spreads to the whole fabric.



Phulkari was awarded the geographical indication (GI) status in India, which means that only registered traders and manufacturers, from Punjab Haryana and Rajasthan states would be able to use the term for the traditional craft,

This applique and patchwork of Bihar is commonly found on wall hangings, Shamianas (or decorative tents and canopies that are used on festive occasions, and on religious and social ceremonies), and even on saris, dupattas, cushion covers, table cloths, curtains, bedspreads, bolster covers etc.

Applique is a craft which has waste pieces of cloth as its raw material. Articles produced by this craft were used by kings and emperors and the nobility in the past as shamiana and chandowa.

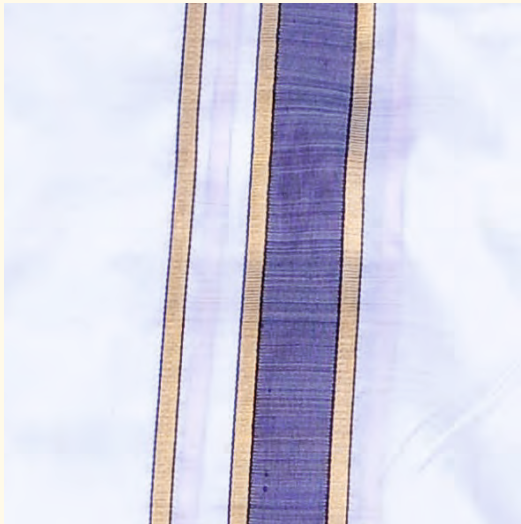

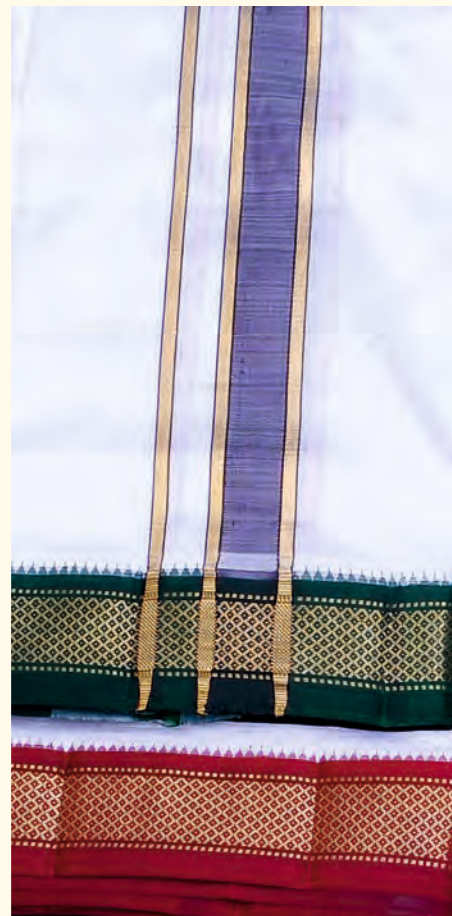

Sandur Lambani Embroidery is a unique type of needle craft done by women only. The clothes of the Lambanis reflect their love of life and evolved across the centuries to suit local climatic and social conditions. Traditionally, men wore simple clothes without any embroidery. The women in contrast dressed colourfully and elaborately with accessories made of silver, brass, white metal and bone.

A method of using small bits of (cloth) material and attaching them to make up the whole garment was unique to the Lambanis which is called as 'patchwork'. The patchwork

was intricate and beautifully executed. At each joint, the patchwork ended in a series of tiny triangles along the seam made by folding the material. The traditional Lambani dress, made up of a skirt (Lehanga), a blouse (choli) and a veil (odhni), are all richly embroidered and decorated with embellishments. The traditional outfit is so elaborate that it takes a Lambani woman about a year to complete a set.

Screw Pine Craft of Kerala

The products being made with screw pine include table mats, floor mats, cushion covers, coasters, bags, box covers, beach hats, hand bags and wall hangings. The mats are often embellished with fine hand embroidery. The two-ply screw pine mats is used for sleeping. It consists of a fine upper layer and a coarse bottom one, with stitching at the edge. Super fine mats are made of very fine screw pine leaf splints placed 8 to 10 per inch. High quality mats of upto 22 splints per inch can also be made by experienced artisans.

Cleaned leaves are spilt in half without disturbing the original length of leaves. This long and narrow leaves are boiled and transferred and kept in fresh water overnight. The leaves are dried and within couple of days it becomes ivory in colour. Once dry, the leaf is straightened using a knife and kept rolled and bundled until the weaving begins. The weave used is with one weft leaf going diagonally between two warp leaves.

This art goes back to more than 100 years.

- A rigorous spring-cleaning of the leather is undertaken, the stuff being soaked in a pit of lime-water for 10-15 days. When the top portion becomes a bit smooth, it is scrapped clean with a knife. Then follows another round of water soaking – this time along with kadaka powder, a local vegetable dye for another ten days.
- The leather now assumes its natural colour of light brown and is ready for the designs to be drawn on it.
- Even on the lampshades, deities hold sway along with animals and floral designs. For drawing the contours, an outlining hand brush is used and thereafter the colours are filled in with vegetables dyes – brilliant reds, greens, whites, yellows, browns and orange ruling the roost.



The creators of these puppets have discovered lampshades on leather to be the best medium to not only keep their traditions and art alive but also to serve as a source of their livelihood. Though the medium of expression has changed, the form continues to be the same. The beautiful and colourful spectrum of lampshades depicting episodes from folklore, Ramayana, Mahabharata, Krishna leela and a host of other characters continue to a narrative form.

After melting pure silver ingots are put through a wire drawing machine to produce very fine hair like wires. Two of the thinnest wires are heated and wound around a "Charkha" and flattened again. These are then twisted together and crimped in to Zig Zag patterns around the ribs of the design formed by thicker strips of silver, and expertly soldered. The motifs are usually leaves, flowers, creepers, animals and birds.

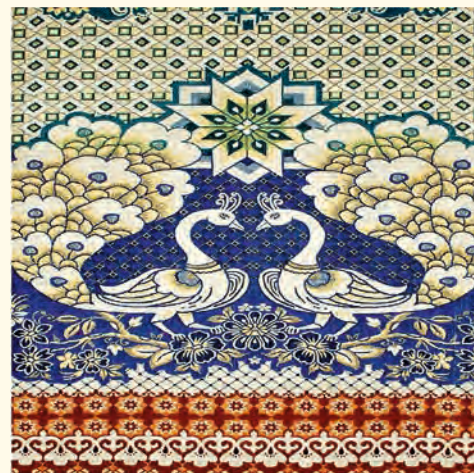

This intricate process of twisting extra weft while weaving creates beautiful geometrical patterns and forms. The design inspiration is generally traditional tribal motif.

The craft originates from 'Vadassery' an old hamlet, now a part of Nagercoil, the capital town of Kanyakumari District. The said geographical indication identifies and indicates the manufactured goods originating in the place of Vadassery in Kanyakumari District of Tamilnadu.

As the craft technique is a father-to-son Passover the exact origin is not recorded.

However according to craftsmen the origin of this craft could be traced back to the early 17th century or even before when the Kings and Chieftains from Chettinad (now in Ramanathapuram District) came to Nagercoil and purchased one set of gold ornaments set with real diamonds for offering to the temple in Chettinad – a must for offerings to temple during festival and marriages.

The popular Thanjavur Art Plates feature design of deities, birds, flowers and geometric patterns beaten out from back of copper and silver sheets. These are then encrusted on a brass tray, pot (kudam) or cup.

Thanjavur art plates are mounted on a wooden base in a variety of ways and are extensively used as mementoes or giveaways. These metal art work are made in brass-metal base, copper, silver ornamentation with embossing technique. Generally the Art plates are round or oval in shape and the base plate in brass from the size of 3" to 48" with the side decoration figures are embossed in silver and copper foils generally in the gauge of 44.

These figure ornaments are either beaten out from the metal surface of the article itself, a kind of repousse, or they are separately made and skilfully soldered or reveted onto the metal article. Thanjavur craft originate in and around Thanjavur during 1755 AD. Thanjavur art plate is an exquisite product of the artisans of Thanjavur. The art of engraving and embossing beautiful figures and images of different size and shapes on metal, mainly silver and fixing them on brass or copper plates is the unique merit of the craft.

The globally acclaimed Tanjore dolls (Toys) are made with plaster of Paris, Wood pulp and, of course, the clay, obtained on river banks of Cauvery. The Tanjore Dolls, which is produced on the basis of gravitational force, used to be produced in pairs i.e. ... Raja and Rani. The Tanjore dolls (Toys) are said to attract the attention of children worldwide due to its unique nature, as it comes to be static when a mischievous child tries to push it or to make it flat.

The plaster of Paris and Paper (Wood) pulp are immersed in the ratio of 1:3 alongwith required tuber flour (Sago) and they were bundled into dough like a "poori" flour. The same is put in the die meant for producing patterns. The die-cast figurine then let to dry in shade for ½ hour. Later on, the die cast figurine is affixed with papers and let to dry for 1 ½ hours. Then two parts of Dolls (Toys) are fixed together and let dry again. After that the doll has given a coat of flour and also fill any gap left in the Doll. Later on, clay is added on the bottom. After that it is dried, the Doll is painted and also give a final touching in the plate.

Thanjavur paintings are a unique painting made by 'Gem-set technique' where sparkling stones (Precious and semi Precious) and gilded gold leaves were extensively employed to create a comprehensive canvas portraying, round shaped figures and all around eyes in glorification of presiding deities like Lord Krishna and others. Thanjavur paintings are painted with a purpose and have a religious leaning and the secular art is restricted and limited to the portrait of kings and patrons.

The composition of the Thanjavur painting is highly stylized with strict observance of iconography giving no room for innovation and experimentation. On the whole an aesthetic rigidity and ergonomic appeal marked the passage of Thanjavur paintings for more than three hundred years of life of Thanjavur painting. The figures are static and stiff

consisting one main figure in complete dominance of the paintings, other figure usually the attendants, devotees and spouses of the main figure or in miniscule and the main figure always set as plump and robust and it seems that the painters of Thanjavur paintings have no learning for slim people.

Thanjavur District lies on the South East coast of Tamil Nadu. The production of the Thanjavur Veena is mainly done by the local artisans who have domicile in an around the town of Thanjavur. The process of carving the Thanjavur veena is painstaking, delicate, time consuming and involves superior craftsmanship.

The Thanjavur Veenai is about four feet in length. It has a large, round body with a thick, wide neck, the end of which is carved into the head of a dragon. A small resonator is attached to the underside of the neck. Thanjavur veena has 24 fixed frets (Mettu), so that all ragas could be played. These 24 metal frets are embedded with hardened bees-wax, mixed with charcoal powder.

Thanjavur veena has seven strings, four are playing strings and three are drone strings (Thalam). It has no sympathetic strings. Melody is produced on four metal strings that run above the frets. These are stretched over a wide bridge that sits on the body of the veena. Three other strings run alongside the neck of the instrument. These are used for maintaining time and for playing the drone. Thus the Thanjavur veena has an interesting construction.

This art-work, practiced exclusively done by the Toda women using red and black threads on a white background, producing a rich effect. This art work is so fine that it is often mistaken as a weave at the first glance. Girls learn this art from their mother at a very young age.

The Toda embroidery is an intricate form of needle work done on a Shawl in continuous bands in lengthwise strips, rather than across the width and is called Pootkhull(zh)y.

Toda embroidery is reversible, so one can use it both sides. The Todas consider the 'rough' obverse side as the right side, with its generous looping of threads that is the display side and the not apparent far neater, reverse side. However, the outsiders feel quite the opposite.

The basic fabric is rough cotton cloth woven specially for the Todas by weavers who are Kolas (another tribe living in the Nilgiris). These weavers used to barter cloth for buffaloes, bull or calf. Now, they sell them for cash.

The design patterns of the Toda embroidery are mostly symbolic ranging from floral motifs to animal and human figures.

It is done in the counted thread technique, following the right angles of the warp and weft threads of the coarsely woven off white material and according to the required pattern, by executing the necessary stitches. This gives the impression a woven, rather than embroidered pattern.

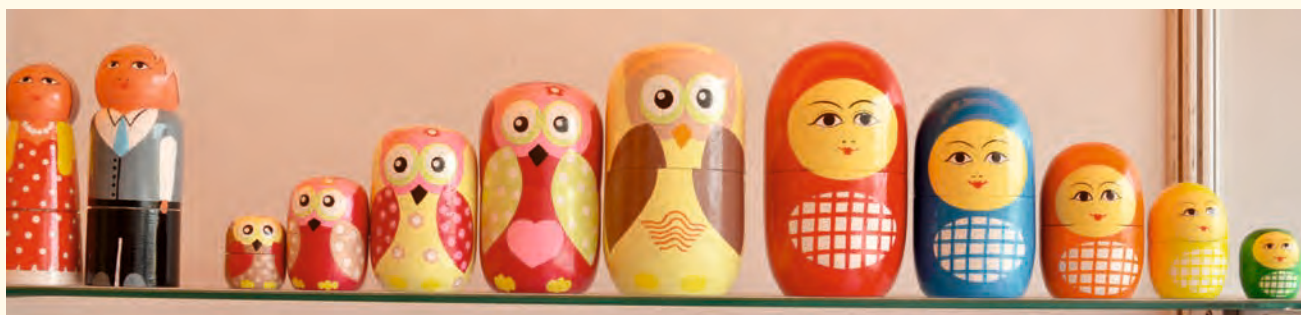

Warli painting is a form of tribal art, done by the tribe called "Warli". The tribe largely resides in 'Dahanu', in Thane district, Maharashtra. Other tribes that participate in warli paintings are Malharkoli, Kokani and Katkari.

Warli paintings started as the decoration of house walls on festive occasions, asking for blessings of God. It is done on brown surface, painted by red colour, called 'Geru'. Traditionally, rice paste mixed in milk or water is used for these paintings. However, these days, artificial colours like poster colours are also used. Other colours used are yellow (turmeric powder) and red ('sindoor' or 'kumkum' powder).

Main occupation of warli people is agriculture. They have religious faith towards Tiger God, whose wooden statues can be seen in many parts of the district. These people live in rough and rocky foothills of Sahaydri range and keep much to themselves.

Borobudur in Java owe their origin to the inspiration of Buddhism. Christianity inspired paintings of sublime quality in medieval Italy and Spain.

Thus, Kangra art is the visual expression of a cultural movement with roots in a great spiritual upsurge. Kangra Painting is not a sudden development unrelated to the life of northern India, but is the culmination of spiritual and literary revival of Hinduism.

These Khana materials are manufactured approximately for the last 200 years and till today they are so popular that 'except these traditional designs no other designs are accepted by the users of khana.

On the other hand, Kachchh is virtually an island, bounded by the Arabian Sea in the west: the Gulf of Kachchh in south and southeast and Rann of Kachchh in north and northeast

The Bandhani is prepared on cotton, silk, wool fabrics. The process of production of bandhani can be summarised as follow: First of all, the textile material is carefully examined for its quality. If necessary, the cloth is bleached. The raw materials required for Bandhani are muslin, handloom or silk cloth, ordinary thread for tying, starch and colours for dyeing. Traditionally vegetable dyes were used but today chemical dyes are becoming very popular. The tools required are also very basic-wooden blocks for marking designs and the simple implements for dyeing.

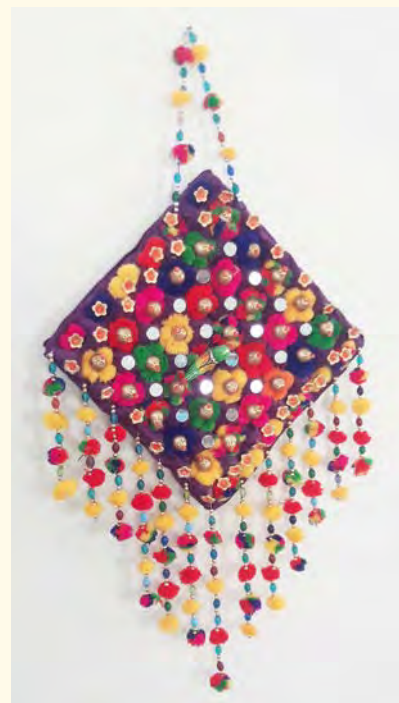
