THE 10TH NATIONAL HANDLOOM DAY CELEBRATION

In 2015, the Government of India took a significant step to honor the country's rich handloom heritage by designating the 7th of August as National Handloom Day. This decision aimed to recognize and celebrate the contributions of the handloom-weaving community, whose craftsmanship plays a vital role in the socio-economic development of the nation. The inaugural National Handloom Day was launched on 7th August 2015 by Prime Minister Narendra Modi in Chennai. Since then, this day has served as a platform to empower handloom weavers and workers, instilling pride in their exquisite skills and helping to preserve the legacy of handloom in India.

The 10th National Handloom Day was celebrated at Vigyan Bhawan, New Delhi, with the esteemed presence of the Hon'ble Vice President of India, Sh. Jagdeep Dhankhar, Smt. Dr. Sudesh Dhankhar, Hon'ble Minister of Textiles, Sh. Giriraj Singh, Hon'ble Minister of State for Textiles, Sh. Pabitra Margherita, and Smt. Rachna Shah, Secretary of Textiles.

An exhibition showcasing award-winning handloom pieces was curated and designed by NIFT Delhi. The exhibition featured exquisite items crafted by National and Sant Kabir awardees from across the country, including intricately woven saris, shawls, stoles, home textiles, and garments.

The Hon'ble Vice President, Sh. Jagdeep Dhankhar, presented the National and Sant Kabir awards to the master weavers. This was followed by a fashion presentation titled "Alankrit," organized by NIFT Delhi and the Centre of Excellence for Khadi, a project at NIFT. The fashion show paid homage to skilled handloom weavers by highlighting the enhancements made to the handloom fabrics. The collections, developed by students, resulted from the craft cluster initiative, where students and artisans co-created, blending contemporary learning with the honed skills and indigenous knowledge of traditional crafts. The fashion presentation was well received by the audience, including the weavers.

All NIFT campuses celebrated the 10th National Handloom Day with great enthusiasm. A variety of activities, including fashion shows, panel discussions, competitions, exhibitions, and craft bazaars, were organized to sensitize students to the significance of handlooms and their role in sustainable fashion. BENGALURU

NIFT Bengaluru commemorated National Handloom Day today with a series of events aimed at celebrating India's rich handloom textile heritage. The chief guests for the event were Sh. Kishan Singh Sugara, Retired IFS; Smt. Seema Singh, handloom enthusiast; and Dr. Mohana Rao, State Director of KVIC. The ceremony began with the lighting of the lamp by the chief guests, along with the Director, Campus Academic Coordinator and Cluster Initiative Coordinator. In their speeches, the chief guests highlighted the importance of preserving and promoting handloom textiles for future generations.

A spate of events followed including display, exhibition, competitions and fashion walk. Departments such as Fashion Design, Textile Design, Knitwear Design, Fashion Communication, and Fashion & Lifestyle Accessories showcased the best handloom products and documents created by students as part of their studies. This display aimed to highlight the students' exceptional work and was visited by 1st and 3rd semester students to gain insights from their seniors' projects. The crafts represented included Nail Knitting from Haliyal, Nimmalakunta Leather Puppetry, Udupi Saris and Dupattas, Bidari, Chintamani, Lambani Embroidery, and Venkatagiri Weaving.

An exhibition was organized featuring seven organizations showcasing various handloom products. The exhibition from August 7th to 9th at the NIFT Bengaluru campus, included Mriganayni (MP Government Emporium); Utkalika (Odisha Government Emporium); Desi (Handloom Fabric from Karnataka); Priyadarshini (Handloom Fabric from Karnataka); Jhar Craft (Jharkhand Silk Textiles); Tribes (Tribal Handlooms and Handicrafts - TRIFED); and Cooptex (Handloom from the Government of Tamil Nadu).

A department-wise competition showcased the creative styling of handlooms by various departments. Both UG and PG students participated enthusiastically, fostering a deeper understanding and appreciation of handloom fabrics versus power loom fabrics. The students' creativity in styling the fabric received significant appreciation.





BHOPAL

National Handloom Day was celebrated at NIFT Bhopal on August 7th, 2024. The event was organized under the leadership of Lt. Col. Ashish Agrawal, Campus Director, Mr. Akhil Sahay, Joint Director, and Dr. Anupam Saxena, Associate Professor, Textile Design Department & Cluster Initiative Coordinator. The chief guest for the event was Prof. Dr. Kailash Rao M, Director of the School of Planning and Architecture (SPA) Bhopal. Impressively, 20% of their products are exported globally, with a balanced revenue stream from both domestic and international sales. Their customer base spans Japan, US, European Union, and UK, highlighting the global appeal of their craft.

Students also interacted with artisans from the Soof embroidery community in the Banas Katha district of Gujarat. This craft recently received a GI tag for its embroidery. The artisans, who mainly work on handlooms to create value-added products, trace their ancestry back to Pakistan, and around 3,000 people in their village are associated with this craft. Sh. Vijayakumar Rathod, an artisan leader, mentioned that their focus is primarily on local sales.

The event underscored the significance of handloom in preserving cultural heritage and promoting sustainable livelihoods for artisans.




MUMBAI
